United Way of America Organizational Changes

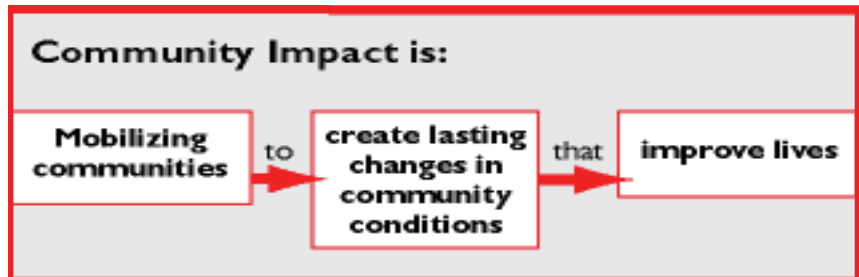
The growth of non-profits, changes in the workforce, the global economy, and many other factors have led United Ways from defining fundraising as their primary business to considering it one of several tools necessary to pursue their new business - achieving sustained community changes.

Other strategies, such as research, advocacy, corporate partnerships, strategic alliances, leveraging and leadership also are required to improve community conditions. In the face of this new model, alignment of resources and activities is imperative - not only within United Ways, but within communities.

“United Way’s new mission calls for a significant change in our business model. It requires a change in our products and our processes and will require a change in our thinking and our structures. Cross-functional work, aligned around improving people’s lives is critical to achieving community impact.” says Brian Gallagher, President & CEO of United Way of America.

Rather than enter into direct service delivery, United Way’s will instead focus on financially supporting the groups that address the key priorities of United Way of America’s national agenda: *early childhood development, 2-1-1 health and human services initiative, community preparedness, housing, and health care access.* As well as Matagorda County United Way’s local initiatives of: *Helping children succeed, Building safe neighborhoods, Fostering independence for seniors, Increasing self-sufficiency, Strengthening families, and Promoting health and wellness.*

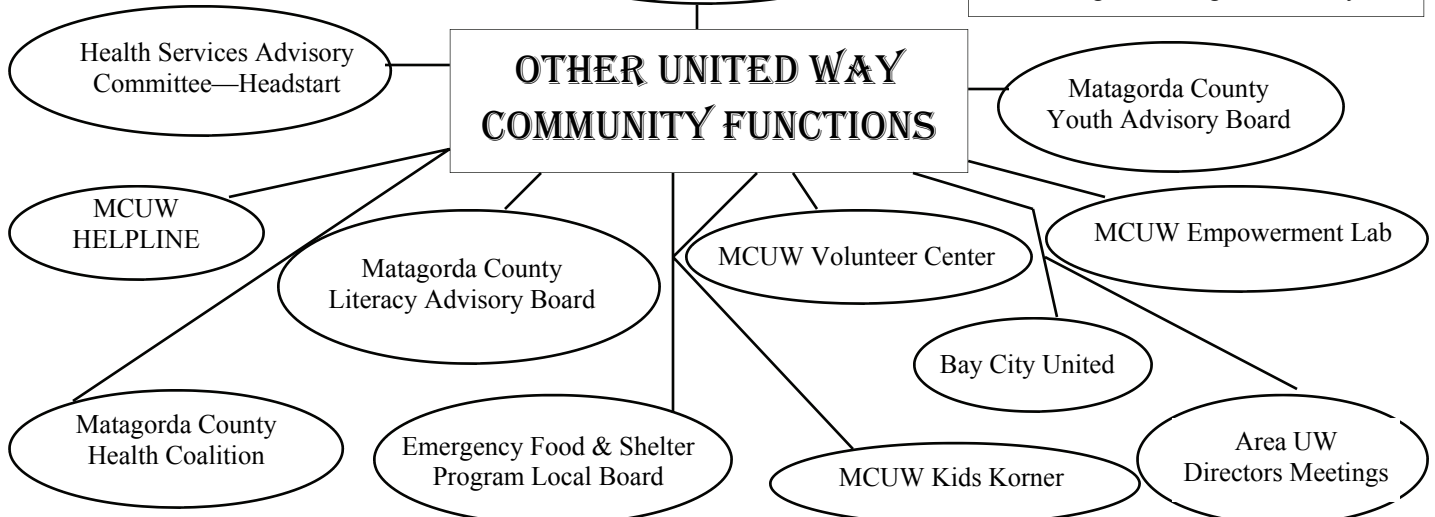

HAPPENINGS at the Matagorda County United Way Office

MCUW continues to work on several collaborative events, committees, advisory boards, and projects.

- **MHCC**— Matagorda Health Care Coalition continues to meet monthly to brainstorm and prepare for upcoming health access grants. Steering committee consists of Matagorda County United Way, Matagorda County Hospital District, Matagorda Episcopal Health Outreach Program & Palacios Medical Center.
- **Boost America** — Campaign has ended with all 150 seats being distributed to individuals throughout Matagorda County.
- **Campaign** — The 2003-2004 Campaign activities are still underway.
- **Empowerment Lab** — The MCUW features an empowerment lab which includes community access to computers, video library, and other literature.
- **First Book Organization**— is a Literacy Advisory Council for the County to help get books into the hands of low-income children.
- **Grant Collaborations**—We continue to collaborate with Community organizations in grant searches, writing proposals, support letters, etc. If these succeed it will bring outside dollars into the County for needed services.

- **Interagency CRCGF Council**— Meets the 3rd Wednesday of every month at 9:00 am at the Railroad Depot. Time is set aside monthly actually helping citizens of the County by active Case Management to find services needed for individuals. Please call 245-5852 to be added to the email list.
- **Kids Korner**— The MCUW office has a Kids Korner for area students to come for computer access, games, puzzles, self esteem videos, etc. Children can also come by the office and get a free book per month through our youth literacy program.
- **Options Program**—Registration forms are available at the MCUW office for the Options for Independent Living program. This program can sometimes help with small home repairs, shower chairs, medication, etc. These services are provided for seniors living on a limited budget.
- **Web Presence**—Our site is now available at www.man-net.org select social services then united way. Links to UW agencies are posted there as well as County statistics and statistics for each funded organization.

• **M.I.G.H.T.'s Long-Term Recovery Committee** – are still working with the families affected by Claudette. This committee will case manage individual family cases after FEMA and other financial sources are tapped out. Needs assessment estimates say \$500,000-\$1,000,000 dollars are needed to get families back to pre Claudette status.

MCUW Information & Referral service is not only an information source. We are doing a lot more case management. Which means helping seniors and disabled fill out government forms, CHIP enrollment forms, and prescription enrollment forms, as well as researching other services and alternatives. The United Way HELPLINE gets on average 250-300 calls or walk-ins monthly.

Recent HELPLINE success stories:

Office personnel are working with several area organizations to help more than 100 children have a happy Christmas by providing clothing, food, or toys.

Several seniors have been helped in finding patient assistance programs for free prescriptions.

The MCUW literacy program has handed out more than 100 books to area children in the county within the past few weeks.
